WHAT'S UP IN WEATHERIZATION?

Weatherization is working hard to finish up their readiness homes. The Readiness fund is provided by the Department of Energy to fix homes that are ineligible for weatherization due to other needed repairs required to be completed first. NEICAC's readiness funds are being used to replace roofs, upgrade electrical, and remove asbestos.

The crew has also been busy with projects at the Smith Building, including new signage and roof repairs.
